Ch 4: Confession Steps to Christ

Part 1: First 2 pages

Chapters 3 and 4 are closely linked together. In Chapter 3 we read of repentance—feeling sorry for our sins and accepting Christ's new heart and way of life. Chapter 4 discusses how the Holy Spirit convicts us to confess our sins to God, Who alone offers forgiveness, and to confess our faults to those we hurt through our sin.

Discussion Questions

Activity

Each person comes up with a lie about themselves (Your real hair color is blue, you can run 100 miles, etc.). Try to convince everyone else that your lie is true. See how long you can keep up the lie! Discuss how confession is like recognizing a lie about yourself and determining to tell the truth. Is it easy to keep up a lie when we know it hurts us and others?

Part 2: Rest of Chapter

Without surrendering to the Holy Spirit, we cannot offer true confession. Jesus helps us to acknowledge our sin without diminishing it. He gives us the strength to humble ourselves and live in the new life He has given us.

"The conditions of obtaining mercy of God are simple and just and reasonable. The Lord does not require us to do some grievous thing in order that we may have the forgiveness of sin[...] but he that confesses and forsakes his sin shall have mercy." (p.37)

"Confession of sin, whether public or private, should be heartfelt and freely expressed. It is not to be urged from the sinner. It is not to be made in a flippant and careless way," (p.37)

"True confession is always of a specific character, and acknowledges particular sins. They may be of such a nature as to be brought before God only; they may be wrongs that should be confessed to individuals who have suffered injury through them; or they may be of a public character, and should then be as publicly confessed." (p.38)

"Confession will not be acceptable to God without sincere repentance and reformation. There must be decided changes in the life; everything offensive to God must be put away. This will be the result of genuine sorrow for sin." (p.39)

"True repentance will lead a man to bear his guilt himself and acknowledge it without deception or hypocrisy." (p. 40)

"The humble and broken heart, subdued by genuine repentance, will appreciate something of the love of God and the cost of Calvary; and as a son confesses to a loving father, so will the truly penitent bring all his sins before God." (p.41)
